

Sergeant *Jack Cooper* started with Cliff Riley who was late. Losing footy supporters had to pay up this week as with special attention for our lone Melbourne fan. Collingwood fans also were fined – they won but Jack just likes fining them. Cliff Riley told of his tribulations going to the footy and ending up very late.

Jack again ran the weekly quiz covering geography, history, people and general knowledge and distributed chocolate frogs to the winners.

Guest Speaker – Lorinne Knight – Pre-planning funerals

Lorinne is employed by Le Pine Funerals as a funeral pre-planning consultant. She outlined the process of funeral planning comparing funding through pre-paid funerals with the alternative of buying funeral insurance. The main points of Lorinne's PowerPoint presentation are summarised below:

What does a funeral cost?

- A funeral worth \$6,000 \$8,000 would cover:
- Coffin or casket
- · Funeral Director's professional fee
- Cremation fees, transportation, flowers, memorial book, clergy services, newspaper notices, catering
- Personal touches: e.g. a video tribute, vocalist, doves, butterflies or balloons released, a piper, RSL / Masonic service

The advantages of paying for a funeral in advance are:

- Takes the responsibility off your loved ones
- Peace of mind
- · You choose the service you want

Two options for pre-paying for your funeral are:

- Funeral Insurance
- Prepaid Funeral

What is funeral insurance?

- Funeral Insurance means a person takes out a policy and pays an insurance premium – much like life insurance
- When the person passes away, the family makes a claim on the insurance policy to help pay for the cost of the funeral

Concerns about Funeral Insurance

- Misleading information around the real cost of Funeral Insurance
- Many unhappy customers are caught by insurance premiums that start low, but rise as you age
- Customers are struggling to continue paying the premiums

To highlight these concerns, Lorinne showed a short video of a television report on the escalating costs that can impact on elderly insurance holders.

Disadvantages of Funeral Insurance

- The premiums start cheap, but rise steeply as you age
- If you can't continue to pay the premiums, you can lose the entire benefit
- Funeral Insurance does not guarantee the total cost of the funeral
- You may end up paying much more in premiums than the actual cost of the funeral. As people are living longer these days, this is a regular occurrence
- You cannot specify your funeral type in advance your family must make arrangements

Funeral Insurance provides good value for people who pass away in a short period of time (but not in the first year or two of the first premium payment, unless death is by accident) However, after approximately seven years, one often pays more in premiums than the actual cost of their funeral

The alternative is a pre-paid funeral plan, paid for at today's price, and used sometime in the future with no further costs incurred by the estate when the holder of the prepaid contract becomes deceased.

The benefits of a pre-paid funeral plan are:

- Paid at today's prices
- Simple to arrange and may be paid off, interest free, over a maximum period of 36 months. No further costs
- Allows you to personalise your service you arrange the funeral with the Funeral Director of your choice. You don't place that task on your family
- The whole benefit goes towards your funeral
- The security of your money is assured the funeral company bears the investment risk, not you
