President's Announcements

President David opened the meeting, welcomed members and guests and announced:

- Friday 7 October is Australian Rotary Health "Hat Day" to raise awareness of, and funds for, mental health issues. This has been identified as a major beneficiary of the Classic Car Festival.
- There is a District Community Services seminar on Friday 7 October. President David and Len Dawson will attend
- The launch of the 2016 Kingston Seniors Festival will be at 10.30 am on Wednesday 5 October adjacent to the Mentone Hub in Mentone Parade Mentone. President David and Brian Foley will attend to run a club stall.
- The Club Christmas Dinner is confirmed for Tuesday 20 December at Woodlands.

Brian Schauer chaired the reminder of the meeting.

Director and members announcements

Brian Foley (community) gave more details of the club stall at the launch of Kingston Seniors Festival.

Although we do not have a specific event for Seniors Week, we can promote club activities such as the car festival and Christmas lunch for people who live alone. Brian added that the board had agreed that funds raised at this week's sausage sizzle would go to Australian Rotary Health. Bunnings is a major supporter of Hat Day through all its stores.

Jeff Needham is convening a youth committee meeting after the club meeting this week.

Brian Schauer (international) reported on a recent committee meeting. A recommendation was made to the board to pay half the annual donation for annual giving to Rotary Foundation now.

Jack Cooper gave an update on the Festival of Wheels planning. A detailed list has been prepared of all tasks to be done and members are requested to volunteer for half or full-day shifts. Len also advised that a meeting of the Mustang Car Club would be held at the same venue on Sunday 23 March where members see a typical display in action.

Paul Taranto reported on his initial meeting with fellow presidents-elects. Membership was a common theme and Paul will bring some new information to the club.

Paul also conducted the weekly Rotary Foundation raffle that raised \$29. Jill Brear and Dr Victoria Stead were the winners for the night.

Brian Foley read a message of thanks from Russ and Bev Hellier for the social afternoon attended by club members and friends

Cliff Riley had met Ann Travers recently who said Bob was helping students learn carpentry skills at Doveton Secondary College.

Sergeant at Arms

Sergeant *Jack Pyziakos* again tested our general knowledge with his quiz dealing with a range of sporting and other topics (e.g. the 24-hour race at Le Mans, "muscle cars" German U-boats).

The nearing footy final climax was a good subject. We all paid on half of Kay for the Cat's demise although she was glad to pay for the Brownlow Medal winner. Somehow St Kilda supporters were among the fines. And Paul Taranto was happy to pay a \$ delight as the Sandy Dragons won the TAC Grand Final and grandson Tim was again among their best.

Speaker: Dr Victoria Stead "PNG Women in the path of war"

Victoria Stead is an anthropologist at Deakin University. She is project leader of a group preparing a history of the women of PNG over the past 100 years focussing on the area of Oro Province close to the Owen Stanley Ranges in the north of the country. This period was dominated by the experiences of the Second World War and its aftermath.

While there have been many stories of violence, particularly against women, arising out of the war, there was also violence during the colonial era when the country was two separate countries, namely Papua and New Guinea. The history of the war was written mainly by outsiders (Australians, Americans and Japanese) with little written from the viewpoint of Papuan New Guinea men and practically none from the women. We know about the "fussy wuzzy angels" because of their work with the Australian soldiers but little else. This has led to a gap in understanding of the affect of the war on local women.

Victoria's study team includes a number of local women who liaise with other women to obtain their stories. At this stage, there are very few women with direct personal knowledge of the war period except a few from their early childhood. They must rely on oral reports and stories gained second-hand or have been handed down over one or more generations. It is a slow and patient process.

Some of the main study findings are:

- The war was very difficult and unpleasant for the women and involved considerable sexual violence
- The Japanese troops stole vegetables and assaulted young women
- Some women helped sick Japanese soldiers

- The war did not make sense to Papuans
- Papuan men were recruited for war related work leaving women at home to do many unfamiliar tasks
- The sexual assaults on women led to many cases of family breakdown due the anger and shame of many men
- The domestic life of families and villages was completely disrupted by the war. Their land and homes were imposed upon and they were restricted in what they could do.

Eventually, the outcomes of the study will be presented to a museum at the University of Papua New Guinea.

Victoria then responded to a number of member's questions. There did not appear to be wide scale ostracism of any offspring from liaison of local women with foreigners. Jill commented that her father had served in the area during the war and spoke of the gentleness of Papuan women.

As a final comment, Victoria said that there were some 800 separate languages in the country and this made them one of the world's most diverse cultures and this adds to the communication difficulties.

Cliff Riley proposed the thanks.
