President David opened the meeting, welcomed members and guests and announced:

Brian Foley (community) gave some details of arrangements for those helping at the barbeque at the SIDS Walk for Remembrance around Albert Park Lake on Sunday 6 November. It was agreed that we take a few bread knives for cutting rolls.

Rob Goode: 38 years experience. Loves undertaking varied projects especially manual tasks, district conferences, meeting great people and people involvement.

Jeff Needham: Development of the Gnome and Fairy festival after success at the first one held George Aivatoglou. Only able to attend about half the year. Enjoys camaraderie and district conferences Brian Schauer: Found first district conference (Shepparton 2002) a mind blowing experience. Learned so much about Rotary.

Len Dawson – The first SIDS and Kids walk especially the release of balloons high in the air.

Presentation on Youth Protection

Carol Quayle gave a short presentation on the revisions to the Rotary Youth Protection Policy explained at the recent seminar. Non-government and volunteer organisations must be complaint from 1 January 2017. Some main features include:

- Development of culture of safety across all Rotary clubs and programs involving children
- Management plan and risk assessment is needed for all programs involving children
- Training in youth protection matters will be incorporated into Rotary training programs.
- Wider use of "Working with Children" checks, and in some cases police checks, will be needed.
