Sergeant Jack Pyziakos ran a short quiz session for which the answers were to do with herring fish and the basketball Hall of Fame. Carol fined Jack for overlooking that she worked on the barbeque all day at Car Show. We all paid up for Australia beating South Africa in the third cricket test. Jack and visiting Rotarian Wayne had worked together in coal mines in Queensland. Jack described how much money the coal industry still makes.

There were \$ delights for Len's birthday, Carol's nephew being general manager of the year for the RSL and a multi-dollar delight for Paul's grandson Tim being picked by GWS as number two in the AFL draft.

Speaker: Rhianne Manners "The Ocean Youth Science Program"

Rhianne is a year 11 student at Mentone Girls Secondary College and was sponsored by the club to attend a special science program run by the Melbourne Aquarium. The program consisted of a series of weekend seminars held once per month for nine months dealing with a wide range of topics relating to marine life and ocean science.

The participants were aged 14 to 18 years and were arranged in teams with each team developing individual projects. Some specific studies included sustainable sea food resources, shark exports, threats to the marine environment and the effects of climate change on ocean health. Participants spent one weekend at Phillip Island where they could swim with seals and dolphins and attend the penguin parade.

They were made aware of problems caused to the marine environment and sea life due to litter such as plastics. They participated in "Clean Up Australia Day" and collected a large amount of rubbish near the aquarium.

Penguins became an area of study for Rhianne. She looking at means to combat climate change and its impact on penguins, competing for money to kick start a campaign to combat peoples' carbon footprint.

Rhianne won a \$100 third prize for her work and plans to use this to assist with an education program.

Rhianne showed various pictures from the study program including study sites around Port Phillip Bay. She also responded to a range of members' questions covering the following matters:

She sees her future involving marine biology but she also wishes to help animals

Some detail on the weekend at Phillip Island included the Nobbies Educational Centre, impact of plastics on marine life, tree planting, revegetation and making penguin boxes for protection of nests.

There is an impact on marine life due to changing water temperatures through climate change. However there are immediate problems created by human beings such as animals impacted by entanglement in fishing nets.

Everything is not negative related to marine life in future. The Ocean Youth program has been going for only two years and its aim is to train young people to be ocean ambassadors.

Rhianne concluded by thanking the club for supporting her to attend this program that has opened up great networking opportunities for her.

Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) Procedure for making electronic payments to NZ earthquake appeal

The link to the RAWCS donation website is: https://donations.rawcs.com.au/Default.aspx?ProjectNo=32&YearRegistered=2016-17

Donors can make	donations	to RAWCS by	selecting:
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□ Credit card – they will fill out their details, click the button "PAY NOW", and they will receive their receipt by return email within a minute of the donation being made.
□ Direct Credit – they will fill out their details, click the button "NEXT" and they will be sent an email within minutes containing the RAWCS bank details and a payment reference number. The donor then has to either: 1 Go to their personal banking website and make an online payment to the RAWCS account, identifying the deposit with the reference number given in the email. 2 Take a cheque to any Commonwealth Bank and deposit it into the RAWCS Bank account and identify the deposit with the reference number given in the email.
A receipt will be sent by email to the donors email address once the cheque has been cleared into the RAWCS bank account.
□ Cheque (by mail) - they will fill out their details, click the button "NEXT" and will be sent an email within minutes containing the RAWCS mailing address and a payment reference number. The donor writes the reference number on the back of the cheque and mails it to the address given in the email.
A receipt will be sent by email to the donor's email address once the cheque has been cleared into the RAWCS bank account.
Donors can also choose to make recurring donations - (Fortnightly, monthly, quarterly, biannually, annually) by any of the means above.
Selecting any of these options will cause a reminder email will be sent to you periodically (depending on the donation frequency you select). This email will contain the following options:
 □ Proceed with donation - deduct a further donation now □ Skip next donation, then continue with schedule □ Cancel all future scheduled donations
If you do not select any of the options within five days of the email being sent, then the 'Proceed with donation' option will be selected for you.

At the request of the National Treasurer all RAWCS projects are now requested to put ALL donations requiring tax deductibility through our online donation facility. Any communication with your Regional Treasurer should also include an email copy to Belinda Griffen – National Administrator (belinda.griffen@rawcs.org.au) - (02) 8833-8317.

She is responsible for receipting all deposits received by mail and direct deposit.

To expend funds from the project account, the RAWCS Project Manager must make a written request to the National Administrator – Belinda Griffen belinda.griffen@rawcs.org.au including all details of the overseas bank account and the beneficiary's name and address to transfer funds from the RAWCS account to the project.

RAWCS has a very favourable foreign exchange arrangement with the Commonwealth Bank and we advise you to get us to send any funds overseas as we are confident that your project will benefit from our transfer compared to any other foreign exchange facility.
