President Paul opened the meeting, welcomed all and visitors and gave the following announcements.

Brian Foley advised that David Brunt and he had attended a recent meeting of the Kingston Service club network. Four Rotary Clubs and two Lions Clubs were repesented Council officers can assist clubs with marketing initiatives and use of social media.

Brian also attended the youth exchange briefing for incoming students on 20 August along with Sarah and Felicity Steele. *Carol* referred to the packing day for the Birthing Kits project that will be held on Saturday 14 October. The event was published in the recent District *Highlights*. A good turnout of members is sought for this project.

Jack Cooper advised that the date and venue for the next Gnome and fairy Festival have been confirmed for Sunday 18 March 2018 at the George Woods Reserve in Governor Road Mordialloc. Jack also reminded that the next district conference will be held at Bendigo from Friday 2 to Sunday 4 March 2018.

Visiting Rotarian *Mahendra Bulsara* told us a little of his club RC Bulsar in Gujarat State on the west of India. The club is active in providing medical help and sanitation facilities and help for underprivileged children.

Sergeant-at-Arms

A short session by Sergeant Cliff covering a range of subjects. Nick Kyrgios lost again and racehorse Winx has now won 18 races straight. Among recent deaths were singer Glen Campbell and former VFL umpire Harry Beitzel, Cliff continued on his history tour of Victoria taking in the Ballarat Begonia Festival and Kryal Castle. Carol was pleased that her daughter now has a permanent job and Paul's grandson survived his first game in the seconds back after injury.

Guest Speaker- David Brunt "Drugs in our Community"

David has had a long history with drug issues in New South Wales, Queensland and Victoria dating back to the early 1970s. He highlighted some significant stages in the history of drug use and prevention in Australia.

In the late 1960s, American troops on R&R leave from Vietnam in Sydney were supplied with heroin leading to a heroin epidemic in that city.

In 1972, the hippie movement lead by Timothy Leary, magic mushrooms and music, enticed many young people into drugs particularly LSD.

In 1973 David established the first drug rehabilitation centre for young people in Queensland. Valium was the drug of choice for many young people in that State.

The drug ICE has been used for many years by truck drivers to stay awake although they now often use legally prescribed opiates.

In 1988 the NSW introduced a needle and syringe exchange program and it has worked. In the Kings Cross area there was a 90% decrease in drug deaths and overdoses.

Prisoners find it very easy to obtain drugs in prison. The evidence is clear that keeping young people out of prison, together with counselling and safe injecting rooms, should keep them alive.

Illicit drugs have now become a major crime statistic throughout the community. Statistics from 2015 show that while alcohol use and smoking are now decreasing, drug use is increasing with 15% of the population regular users and 42% having used drugs at some time in their lives. Heroin addiction has been replaced by morphine and some of this is delivered legally by GPs.

In the late 1980s, David studied the drug scene in London and, when questioning young people why they used drugs, the common answer was that it was the only fun they had.

David believes, along with many other specialists, that the traditional methods of drug rehabilitation have not worked and it is necessary to get politicians away from the "war on drugs" mentality. They also need to take some responsibility for what is happening. Supervised injecting rooms provide clean needles and clean drugs and ensure that the drug taking is as safe as possible. This is what has lead to the 90% reduction in drug overdoses in NSW. It has been achieved with no significant increase in crime.

The decriminalisation of drugs has had some success overseas, e.g. Norway. It is obviously a political issue. We also need to get addicts to accept responsibility for their situation rather than denial.

David responded to a number of members' questions that explored further the matters raised in the talk.

Email Message received from Kay Gordon, 28 August

New arrival happy news

Hi to you all,

Just to let you all know at home that after 9 days overdue we welcomed a little girl into the Gordon family at 2 am Ireland time, both mum and baby are well, as yet unnamed weighing 8lb 11oz. She is beautiful. Everyone here very happy and excited, and relieved the waiting is over.

Since I last updated you we have seen a big improvement in Clodagh, she finishes the first lot of intense treatment, it was pushed out a little because of temperatures and other infections, but she has had drug changes and other things happen, she is now smiling again, and interacting with us, even the nurses are getting smiles. She is still in the Crumlin children's hospital and maybe here for a couple more weeks. We will find out this week what treatment plan Clodagh will be on next.

Eimear and Cameron were able to get a room in Ronald McDonald house here, I have moved in as well, which makes it easier than driving up from Navan. We will be able to have the new baby there as well. It's very comfortable with twin beds and a large bathroom. Cameron does the night shift with Clodagh. Corporate companies come into the house during the week and cook meals for the families, the families are very well looked after.

Last Thursday Cameron and I took some time out and went into Dublin for a few hours sightseeing, we did the hop on hop off bus, hand lunch in an old Irish pub, I had Irish stew, did a little shopping and then came back to the hospital. It was lovely to have the break together.

Well know more news I think the baby might be unnamed for a few days yet. The weather hear has been surprisingly warm up to 22 degrees a bit humid, then of course showers to follow at night. They are sports mad here at the moment with Gaelic football finals, and of course the Irish boxer who fought in Las Vegas yesterday Its been a long tiring day, very little sleep last night so I can see I will be in bed early.
