# Guest Speaker – Dr Kathy McGuire "Giving back. How Rotary helped shape by life in music"

Kathy received a Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarship in 1994-95, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Mordialloc. This enabled her to study music at the University of Surrey, Guildford, UK, for 12 months where she qualified with a Master's degree in music with a major in conducting. During her time in UK, Kathy had many conducting opportunities with local orchestras as well as visiting rehearsals of the English National Opera. She met renowned Australian conductor Simone Young and travelled through Europe with her and attended some operatic performances that Simone conducted..

Kathy had previously known about Rotary for a long time as her grandfather, local historian Frank McGuire, had been a member of Chelsea Rotary and her father, also Frank, was a member of Seaford Rotary although not at the time of her Ambassadorial Scholarship.

Simone Young had given her some useful career advice including that the best opportunities for female conductors might be in USA. After completing her Ambassadorial Scholarship, Kathy returned to Australia for some time. She then travelled to USA and was accepted at the University of Colorado at Boulder as a candidate for Doctor of Musical Arts. She received a full tuition waiver and a teaching position as well as free accommodation. Outside university, Kathy conducted many local choirs and orchestras and was Music Director at a local Episcopalian church. She also spoke at local Rotary clubs and graduated in May 2000.

After graduation, Kathy applied for about 60 positions, mainly at universities. She auditioned, partly as a joke, and was successful with a full-time position as artistic director of the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus with some 200 male members. She was also involved with a community women's orchestra. In these positions, Kathy met many politicians and celebrities and became aware of the power of music as a means for change.

Among the celebrities Kathy was involved with were Joan Rivers, Carol Channing, Alan Cumming, Lily Tomlin, Cameron Daddo and even Dame Edna Everage. Kathy utilised her vocation was to use music as a means for positive change in activities such as:

- SFGMC: *SingOut* program, raised \$500K USD for health service organisations e.g. AIDS/HIV
- Co-founded GLAM Youth Choir (Gay, Lesbian & Allied Musicians) in San Francisco
- Volunteered as a rider and roadie in the AIDS LifeCycle (annual ride, San Francisco to Los Angeles)
- Co-founded a women's bike riding group; organised rides from San Francisco monthly
- Founded and led Singers of the Street (SOS) in San Francisco – choir for people at risk of homelessness

Kathy returned to Australia in 2013 and took up a position as Director of Music at Queens College, University of Melbourne. She also collaborated with Jonathon Welch of the "Choir of Hard Knocks", on composing and conducting "Street Requiem" a work for choir and orchestra that has been performed 25 times in three countries and received international recognition. She has continued to work with various orchestras and supports many causes.

Kathy spoke at the District 9800 Conference in 2016 and subsequently joined the Rotary Club of North Balwyn
