Director and members announcements

Jeff Needham (projects) reported a preliminary profit estimated at \$3800 from the Gnome and Fairy Festival. Printing and security costs were higher than expected.

Brian also commented on recent letters from The Rotary Foundation wrongly addressed to individual Rotarians and the follow up explanatory email that was also poorly worded and ambiguous.

Jack Pyziakos took names for the Bunnings barbeque on 23 April and thanked George, his wife Margaret and Brian for running the barbeque at the Bunnings trade and family night. A estimated 400 persons attended – many more than expected.

Sergeant at Arms

Jack Pyziakos was back on the job. All present paid for the Aussies winning their Davis Cup match and Kyrios being back in the good books. AFL Footy winners were fined, David Brunt for St George and Len for Tottenham. Storm lost for Jack. Jack's general knowledge quiz covered past political leaders, leading sportsmen and Vegemite! Paul Taranto gave an update on grandson Tim's footy career with the giants following their recent win in Tasmania.

Guest Speaker – Sarah Heathcote "The Rotary Action Group against Slavery"

Sarah is an osteopath by profession and president of the Rotaract Club of Monash from which she will be leaving this year having reached the retiring age. In the week before her talk to us, she had been assisting as trainer for a fundraising event known as "Polipedal", comprising politicians and returned soldiers, in aid of "Soldier On"

Sarah became involved in the Rotary Action Group against Slavery having seen their display at the 2014 Rotary Sydney Convention.

Currently there are an estimated 48.5 million people worldwide affected by slavery which is defined as one person having complete control over one or more others, usually for money. The problem exists in all countries and affects more people than ever before in history. By comparison, the transatlantic slave trade from Africa to the Americas in past centuries affected around 10 to 12 million. Some slavery is forced by government. Australia has relatively small impact on global numbers with an estimated 4300 people involved.

174 different goods produced in over 80 countries rely on forced labour, notably in cattle and other agricultural production, rubber, carpets, fishing, construction and the commercial sex trade. It is the second largest illegal enterprise behind drugs with an estimated \$US150b profit per annum. 80% of people trafficked are women. Migrants who arrive legally are most vulnerable. Forced and child marriage are also classified as forms of slavery.

While the direct incidence of slavery in Australia is small, we still have an significant indirect influence by the importation of goods produced under slave conditions such as much seafood from Asia. Other examples of particular commodities and countries include:

The Congo – mining of a rare mineral that comprises a key element of most mobile phones is carried out by young children under highly dangerous conditions.

Ivory Coast – produces 40% of the world cocoa supply harvested by child slave labour

India – an estimated 18 million slaves are involved in cotton picking and cottonseed production.

The sex industry represents 60 to 80% of all slavery and is present in all countries.

What can be done to combat slavery? Suggestions include: Talk, learn, buy fair trade, write, act by joining a group such as: Walk Free, Free the slaves, Alliance Against Modern Slavery, Stop the Traffik or the Rotary Action Group. Sarah's passion for her subject inspired a number of members' questions.

Jeff Needham proposed the thanks.
