Kay has brought forward her trip to Ireland and left on Saturday and will be away for about two months Corrections for the district directory have been completed by Secretary Carol 	Guest speaker: Geoff Arnold "Mordialloc Theatre Company" The Mordialloc Theatre Company has been running for 75 years. It was formed by a number of emigrants from England who had background in repertory theatre. Geoff joined the company as a teenager and has been involved for almost 50 years. Over the years he has undertaken almost every onstage and offstage role. He is currently production manager and responsible for marketing.

Geoff explained in detail the production process. A balanced program of four shows per year is agreed and then advertised widely through various drama groups. Actors seeking parts are inviting to interview "cold reading" their parts from scripts made available beforehand.

The production coordinator prepares a cardboard model of the set and, once agreed, construction can proceed. Various props are borrowed or purchased via e-bay. Similarly costumes are made, borrowed or hired.

The company no longer has exclusive rights to the Shirley Burke Hall and can only afford to hire it for five weeks per show (two weeks rehearsal and set up, three weeks for show). However the company is able to use a scout hall in Cheltenham for rehearsals at other times. The hire cost of the theatre is \$9000 for a five weeks per show, plus script royalty, \$1K to \$2.5 K, other costs \$3000. This is generally covered by 85% attendance in the 170 seat theatre over three weeks of a show.

Damian's Musings Post Traumatic Stress Disorder

"Wars that never end"

Prevalence of PSD

Community based studies reveal a lifetime prevalence for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder ranging from 1% to 14%, with variability related to methods of ascertainment and the population sampled. Studies of at-risk individuals (e.g. combat veterans, victims of volcanic eruptions or criminal violence) have yielded prevalence rates ranging from 3% to 58%.

Course

Post Traumatic Stress Disorder can occur at any age including childhood. Symptoms usually occur within the first three months after the trauma, although there may be a delay of months, or even years, before symptoms appear. Frequently, the disturbance initially meets criteria for Acute Stress disorder in the immediate aftermath of the trauma. The Symptoms of the disorder and the relative predominance of re-experiencing, avoidance, and hyper-arousal symptoms may vary over time. Duration of the symptoms varies, with complete recovery occurring within three months in about half of cases, with many others having persisting symptoms for longer than 12 months after the trauma.

The severity, duration and proximity of an individual's exposure to the traumatic event are the most important factors affecting the likelihood of developing this disorder. There is some evidence that social supports, family history, childhood experiences, personality variables, and persisting mental disorders may influence the development of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. This disorder can develop in individuals without any predisposing conditions, particularly if the stressor is especially extreme.

Key Diagnostic Criteria

The person has been exposed to a traumatic event in which both of the following were present:

- 1) The person experienced, witnessed, or was confronted with an event or events that involved or threatened death or serious injury, or a threat to the physical integrity of self or others
- 2) The person's response involved intense fear, helplessness, or horror. Note: In children, this may be expressed instead by disorganised or agitated behaviour.
