## **Message from President Paul Taranto**

## **Director and Member Announcements**

Brian Foley, acting secretary in Carol's absence, advised that he distributed mail and incoming to various members for attention. When Brian returned home from the Gnome and Fairy festival on Sunday afternoon, there was an email message from a lady asking when the festival would be re-scheduled. The message was sent at 10.36 am and at that time the festival had not been called off! A non-committal reply was sent to her. Paul had also received calls during the day

Brian also reported on his visit to Doveton Secondary College that day to see progress on the student project to build a shelter shed. The shed is now almost complete and is of good standard. The students did most of the work and were supervised by volunteer tradesmen. Brian also met with college principal Greg McMahon and discussed a range of Rotary related issues. Greg is prepared to speak to the club on education programs for students from disadvantaged communities.

## Sergeant-at-Arms

Sergeant Cliff ran a short fines session focussed mainly on the busy sporting season. The start of the AFL season, rugby (already started), St George winning two matches, the Grand Prix, cricket, Roger Federer finally losing a match and St Kilda moving back to Moorabbin all were mentioned. Keith Carpenter is officially a cricket legend.

## Speaker: Peter Degorski: "Why are brains and thunderstorms the same but a little different?"

Peter Degorski has been known to President Paul since he attended the national Youth Science Forum in 2010. Subsequently, Peter studied science at Melbourne University and graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree followed by a Masters Degree in Science majoring in atmospheric physics.

After graduation, Peter worked for some two years with the Bureau of Meteorology studying the behaviour of clouds and thunderstorms and applying advanced computer analysis to identify patterns and thus predict future storm behaviour.

Peter then moved on to work at the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute that engages in high level medical research on a wide range of medical conditions and diseases. As an example, Peter referred to the use of powerful computers that are used to process and analyse the enormous volumes of data required to detect and identify abnormalities in DNA sequences that affect brain function. He described this process often as searching for a needle in a haystack situation, but with the resources now available, it is possible to carry out the studies.

Although Peter is trained in atmospheric physics, which seems a long way from medical research, there are similarities in the process between medical and atmospheric research. For example, both the human brain and storm clouds emit electrical impulses that can be examined to detect patterns and changes. There are also differences between the brain and clouds such as the density of matter, function and moisture content, that need to be taken into account.

Peter also mentioned that members of his research team come from different backgrounds and work on entirely separate medical problems. However they collaborate regularly to discuss progress and share ideas on how to undertake the various studies.

Peter then responded to a number of member's questions relating to his work at the Walter and Eliza Hall Institute and medical research generally.

Jack Cooper proposed the thanks.
