Message from President Jack Pyziakos

This week my inspiration comes from the challenges of our guest speaker Nina Owczarek, who spoke about Glaucoma, mainly child glaucoma She spoke about the eye pressure and how the symptoms are very hard to detect and if not treated the child will go blind; about understanding and recognising that something is not right, the awareness of the health professionals in listening to parents about what is happening to their children and for the years of continual monitoring, guiding and mentoring their children to ensure they are very capable.

Not only does Nina have a child with glaucoma, but she is also involved with Glaucoma Australia and endeavours to give back to help people understand

Her clear message to all was to ensure you have your eyes tested every 2 years, or if you think there is something not right. So if you have not done this, please do so as the first step, as losing your eyesight is one of the worst things to happen.

When my father in law, Mr Jack Hungerford lost his sight at about 94, he said that was the worst as he could no longer read books in his spare time, and it made living very hard.

My other inspiration is Rob Goode. I attended his funeral this week and I have witnessed his work with

Rotary and his service above self, his being an inspiration to others and the respect he received from others. Even though Rob has been with the club for 40 years, there is always more that you can learn about him as a person, and indeed this happened on Thursday. Rob will be very sadly missed by all at the Club. As an organisation, our condolences go out to Rob's family.

Condolences also to the Tarantos as their black Labrador, Jetson has gone to a higher watering hole.

Guest Speaker: Nina Owczarek – Children with Glaucoma

Nina talked about glaucoma and the goals of Glaucoma Australia and she shared with us her personal story

about her son Bailey's glaucoma diagnosis when he was just a baby.

Childhood Glaucoma is an unusual condition - glaucoma mainly affects older adults, plus quite a few people in their 30s and 40s. Known as "the silent thief of sight", there are no obvious signs as you develop glaucoma and by the time it is diagnosed, you may have already lost a lot of sight.

At age 2 months, Nina took Bailey to the GP as his left eye looked different. He was immediately rushed to the Royal Children's Hospital with high eye pressure which required emergency surgery. In the ensuing years, Bailey needed 15 more operations and also cataract surgery. Special care was needed in raising Bailey, for example he couldn't be allowed to cry as it increases blood pressure.

Bailey is now 8 and is a robust and happy little boy with some vision impairment as a result of the glaucoma. His condition has to be managed and there are things he can't do – e.g. he can go in pool, but not in the ocean as microscopic particles can get into the drainage channel of his eyes and cause infection; and others he can happily participate in, such as ballet, which he enjoys.

As a result of her experience, Nina wanted to help other parents and children with the challenges of how to manage on-going developments from the condition and how to be an advocate for your child. She volunteered with an organisation in the USA and contributed information on their website. She now works with Glaucoma Australia and sits on 2 councils helping to increase awareness. Nina stressed the importance of early detection as childhood glaucoma is very aggressive, every day is important and children need to see an ophthalmologist as soon as possible.

What is glaucoma? A group of eye diseases where vision is lost due to damage to the optic nerve. It is thought that 300,000 Australians may have glaucoma, but only 50% are diagnosed. There is a higher risk of developing the disease if family members have it also. For adults, the disease may develop over time and it is important to get eyes tested regularly. Treatment is with eye drops to control the pressure. At present, the optic nerve can't be repaired, although research is showing some good results.

Nina finished by answering a number of questions from members.

Dianne Taranto proposed the vote of thanks.
