President's announcements:

President Paul welcomed Rotarians and guests and then announced that the main business of the evening would be committee meetings.

Paul also chaired the remainder of the meeting.

Reports and member announcements

Treasurer *Graeme* gave a brief overall summary of club finances for the Rotary year. Club total funds amount to approximately \$45,000. At this stage, we have raised \$14,000 through various means and paid out some \$32,000 as donations and contributions to project costs.

Jill held a table selling succulents as part of the club the "Meet and Greet" stall at Centreway Mordialloc on the previous Saturday morning, 8 May. Sales went well, as 60 were sold and raised \$220. Plants in pots seemed very popular. Succulent sales now total \$395.

Brian referred to the program for the online district training assembly over the week 23 to 30 May. There are sessions available for all Rotarians. Paul and Brian attended the District Presidents' meeting on Friday last and saw a hybrid meeting in action – with a few hiccups.

Dianne reminded of the visit to the Beckingham Winery in Moorabbin to be there at 1 pm on Sunday 16th.

Committee Discussions

Members then moved into meetings of the Community and Projects committees. Summaries of matters discussed are as follows:

Community

- The Reclink "Love the Game" carnival is confirmed for Wednesday 9 June at Elwood. Jack Pyziakos with BBQ trailer and three other volunteers needed. Cost to feed about 100 persons \$300 to \$400.
- Rotary SAFE program (<u>https://rotarysafefamilies.org.au/</u>) needs further investigation.
- Agreed that we consider an annual award or donation to Mordialloc Theatre Company in memory of Don Butler
- We could consider the offer from Bean's Republic for a Christmas luncheon for the Parkinson's group.
- The committee would seek out another school in Northern Territory for a donation of hygiene kits to follow the Lajamanu project.

Projects

- The possibility of holding an artisan's market at Mentone Railway Station Gardens be discussed with both Kingston Council and the Friends of Mentone Railway Station
- A few possibilities for using surplus tools from the Mordialloc Men's Shed were discussed. Jeff Needham who is involved with the East Bentleigh Men's Shed also has plenty of surplus tools.
 Donation of such tools to the Rotary Donations in Kind group could be one use. Alan suggested that surplus tools be sold through a Sunday market where there is a steady demand.
- Club 50th Anniversary Celebration. Good progress achieved recently. Jack Cooper and Brian Foley are working on the club history.

WORLD LEADERS TAG 2023 FOR THE LAST CASE OF POLIO!

The following article is due to be published in the June 2021 edition of Rotary Down Under. It was prepared by PDG Bob Aitken, the Rotary International Zone 8 Coordinator for the "End Polio Now" program. Bob was the editor of Rotary Down Under for many years

The END POLIO NOW 'end game' is under way ...

Exciting news is that senior leaders with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and the World Health Organisation have agreed that our world should see the last case of wild polio virus by the end of 2023. Then, with the completion of the required three-year polio free period, our world should be declared 'polio free' by the end of 2026!

This rationalisation is the start of the planning process by GPEI, based on current facts and figures and what our leaders learn behind the scenes.

RI Past Vice President Mike McGovern, Chair of Rotary International's PolioPlus Committee, told a zoom meeting of RI END POLIO NOW Zone Coordinators on May 11 he had never been more 'optimistic' about the ultimate success of our 45 years plus campaign.

'All the signs are there,' he said. 'For the first time, recent sampling along the Pakistan/Afghanistan border (60 sites) has found no trace of the wild polio virus. It has been 14 weeks since the last case of the wild polio virus was reported – and only two cases this year.'

Chair Mike said his optimism was still tinged with caution, given we were close to zero cases a couple of years ago, but emphasised 'all the signs were encouraging'.

Given that good news, RI Past President and Rotary Foundation Chairman Elect John Germ, brought the meeting back to reality with the warning that end of Rotary year fund raising was vitally important for Rotary teams to maintain the pressure in 2021/22.

'We will need every cent of the Gates Foundation US\$100 million matching grant to continue funding every aspect of our campaign. To qualify, RI must raise US\$50 million by June 30 and, at this time, we are lagging by US\$4,482,000 compared to the same period last year,' he said.

'Some 26 of our 41 regions are down on Polio giving and only 128 Districts (less than half have donated 20% of their DDF to Rotary's priority project.'

Past President John urged EPN team leaders to go back to their coordinators and urge them to work with RI Directors and TRF Trustees in their Regions to stir fundraising support.

'Challenge your own fellow Zone Coordinators, District Governors and other senior leaders to join the cause and give personally as an example to Districts and Clubs.

'Encourage your teams to lean on the non-givers' he urged.

'There are still too many Rotarians who have never given personally to END POLIO NOW,' he concluded.
