Di reported on the following matters:

### Guest Speaker – Jessica Woolley "Digital Coercive Control in Family Violence"

Chairman Glenyse introduced Jess who she met through the Parkinsons Support Group where her mother is a participant. Jess has degrees in Arts and Law at Deakin University and is currently studying for an honours degree in criminology through research into digital coercive control of women in Victoria.

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Continued from Page 2 Jess has provided a copy of her detailed presentation and is happy to have details published in this bulletin. The following covers some of the main issues discussed and some questions raised by members during last week's meeting.	These issues are being addressed through a series of structured interviews among practitioners and support workers, academics and victims and across metropolitan and regional Victoria. Jess responded to a range of members' questions:
<ul> <li>Responses to family and domestic violence in Victoria over time:</li> <li>Pre-1970s - Police reluctant to treat domestic and family violence as worthy of intervention</li> <li>1970s – Women's refuge movement challenged this attitude.</li> <li>1985 – United Nations adopted a resolution against family and domestic violence. This prompted Australian jurisdictions to use civil law for assault cases in the home.</li> <li>1985 – late 1990s - Law evolves on physical family violence</li> <li>Late 1990s – Range of maltreatment against women broadened in law to include emotional, psychological, financial and physical abuse</li> <li>2000 onwards – Victoria innovative in family violence with whole of government approach</li> <li>2015-16 – Royal Commission into Family Violence</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Funding of her research. – Not needed at present. Might be needed in future.</li> <li>Are mental health issues a problem? This is one of many factors</li> <li>Police response, referring to a recent death in Queensland Further changes in police and justice systems is needed.</li> <li>Do restraining orders work? - Sometimes they work but they are easy to break and often are.</li> <li>The outcome of the justice system in operation. Many perpetrators do not seek help from a psychologist – Agreed prison can be a revolving door.</li> <li>Is abuse increasing or reducing? – Rate does not seem to be changing much over time.</li> <li>Use of the term "family and domestic violence." Why not just violence. – Family violence is used in Victoria and is relevant to indigenous families.</li> <li>Problem with communicating with people whose first language is not English. Consider this in research? – Not the subject of current research but could include it if she continues in further study of the subject.</li> <li>In response to a question to her future career, Jess said that she hoped to study further for a PhD and then</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>(56%), social isolation (54%), accused of an affair (54%), stalking (41%).</li> <li>A recent definition of coercive control is <i>"the use of devices and digital media to stalk, harass, threaten and abuse partners or ex-partners (and children)"</i>,</li> </ul>	pursue a career in academia or policy making area of government. Glenyse gave the vote of thanks for Jess's detailed presentation.
Technology now provides perpetrators with "greater ease in controlling victim-survivors' lives and new means of perpetrating abuse such as stalking, harassment and isolation."	Our Sponsors and some Business Partners
Women living in rural, regional and remote areas often experience isolation in both a geographic and social sense, compounding their vulnerability to intimate partner violence. Identified risk factors include limited access to medical and support services; fewer employment and education opportunities; family income being controlled by one person in the case of family businesses. These factors are the subject of further study into the best means of addressing the situation of women in rural areas compared with those in urban areas.
