President announcements 26 October 2021

President Brian welcomed everyone and thanked all who organised and helped at the Mordi market last Saturday. We had some twenty stalls in place and everything went well including the QR check in process. There was a steady flow of customers throughout the day and the atmosphere felt good. We made a profit of some \$950 on the day and it looks very promising to be even better over the coming summer months.

It is good to see that we are finally on the way out of lockdown in Victoria. However, it is a slow and gradual process and important that we continue to follow appropriate Covid precautions in regard to vaccinations, mask wearing and social distancing. Trina has sent an email seeking members vaccination details. The club is required to maintain a register of vaccination details of all members and other volunteers at any of our markets, sausage sizzles and other events

The monthly DG meeting with club presidents and other Rotarians last Friday was entirely taken up with discussion and Q & As related to mandatory vaccinations for Rotarians and all volunteers on our projects. The meeting was recorded and I can supply the link for any who wishes to see and listen to it

We are looking for someone to run and edit the club Facebook page. We have had one member contact me so far and we could use a couple more the make it a team effort

24 October was World Polio Day. Quite a lot of information is available about Rotary's involvement in polio eradication over nearly 40 years. There was an interesting article in yesterday's Age newspaper by a lady in her seventies who had polio as a child, who now runs a support group for some 40,000 Australians who had polio as children and have developed "post-polio" syndrome in their later years. We have a friend with that condition.

David Brunt was advised today that we can meet again at Woodlands from next week on. Next Tuesday is Cup Day, so no meeting. The following week, 9 November, we are due to meet for committees. Brian asked for comments on the proposed meeting schedule for the rest of the year – more to follow.

Guest Speaker:

Paul Taranto gave a very interesting audio/visual presentation on the petrochemical industry in Australia, which he has worked in over many years. His talk covered the part petrochemicals play in our lives, Altona's story, the factors at play and the outlook for the future.


Some background:

Petrochemical products are everywhere in our daily lives, including plastics, fertilisers, packaging, clothing, detergents and much more. The term is short for chemicals derived from petroleum and the chemicals are categorised as: basic, intermediate and final product. Paul is involved in the basic group consisting of ethylene, propylene and benzene.

Some history:

The Standard Vacuum Oil Company (SVOC) (now known as ExxonMobil) were early adopters of extracting value from oil refinery operations by linking them to petrochemical plants.

 1949 SVOC built the oil refinery at Altona. The company developed petrochemical plants alongside their oil refineries around the world, including Baytown Texas, USA, where Paul worked for 3 years.



The Victorian State Government announces a 23 million pound petrochemical industry was to be built on a 527 acre cite in Altona.

- 1961 BF Goodrich Chemical Co. was the first to commence production at Altona, followed by the Altona Petrochemical Company, Union Carbide, Dow and ASR. In 1963, the Hoechst High Density Polyethylene Plant commenced operation, followed in 1969/70 by the Longford and Long Island Point gas and crude oil processing plants. At its prime, the Altona complex was very significant.
- 1987 after reducing tariffs, the government ended all tariffs, which started the process of change which takes us to where we are today.

Qenos (Altona) was formed in 1999 by combining the ExxonMobil owned business Kemcor with the Orica owned polymer business at Botany. It is a joint venture.

Where is the industry now?

- 2000 the reality of running a petrochemical operation in Australia started to hit and shut downs of a number of businesses occurred.
- 2005 Qenos was sold to Cem China.
- 2009 the rupture of the ethane pipeline in Port Phillip Bay resulted in Huntsman's West Footscray polystyrene plant shutting down.
- 2010 a \$195m expansion project was approved, and in 2011 Qenos celebrated 50 years of operation
- 2017 Qenos launched ExSource, its specialty polymers/products arm.

In 2019 Mobil Altona celebrated 70 years and was very upbeat. Then Covid came along and diminished the demand for petrol and diesel. In September 2021 the Mobil refinery ceased operation and Qenos has announced it will reconfigure its Altona operation, resulting in the closure of the Plastics Plant and the Scal-1 Ethylene Steam Cracker.

Factors at play:

Paul outlined factors at play for the future of the industry, including: market size, availability of advantaged feedstock, scale, government settings and infrastructure.

What does the future look like?

- Australia and the world will continue to need the polymers that the petrochemical industry produces.
- New processes/technologies will be developed that will deploy the chemistry already known to produce the monomers required to produce the polymers: Hydrogen. Circular economy. The Altona and Botany operations will continue for some years yet with ethane feedstock coming from the Bass Strait and Cooper Basin provinces.
- Qenos has world standard polymer chemists and technical laboratories.
- Qenos still has the advantage of having a number of different polymer production

technologies which allows it to move quickly as Australian market needs shift.

- Qenos also has a specialty import arm (Ex-Source) that has partnership relationships with other polymer and specialty product companies.
- Qenos continues to supply specialty services to its shareholder ChemChina.

Guest Speaker:

Keith Stevenson has been a lecturer at Melbourne University in Politics within the Arts faculty.

In 2013 Keith went to North Korea. North Korea is half the size of Victoria. It was easy to get into North Korea, but they ask travellers to not bring in any religious propaganda. You can take cameras etc, as the internet doesn't work for foreigners in North Korea.

Keith's presentation consisted of a detailed history of Korea from 1945 onwards. Keith also discussed the class system. As an economist Keith was interested in the economy in Korea and he travelled around 60 % of the country over 13 days. He wasn't worried about his personal safety from petty crime at this time, but you can't travel by yourself in North Korea and there is an absence of tourism. Keith shared his photos from his holiday and included a picture of the 'Rocket Hotel'. Football is very big in North Korea, the sporting facilities are very high class.



You must be formally dressed to visit the statues of Kim Jong-il and Kim Jong-un. Children in North Korea seemed to be healthy and well dressed. Public transport buses were reasonable in pe yong ying, and bikes are a very popular mode of transport. Keith has a photo of the big parade ground that we see on the news, and told us that North Korea has a big reputation in film production.

Glenyse called for questions.

Paul asked whether Keith's experience was representative of the whole country? From what Keith saw, the level of nutrition and clothing was high. He concluded that there was a reasonable standard of living in North Korea. Cliff asked what the basis is for their economy. Keith explained that they hold consumption to a basic level and they put the money towards armed defence. Korea's main power is coal and hydro. The Korean's value education highly.

Glenyse gave a vote of thanks.


